# A Day Out Helping The Environment

A FAMILY day out with a strong environmental message is being arranged for the field adjacent to the Village Hall in June.

Last summer's special

now the Hethersett
Environmental Action Team
(HEAT) is planning another
community event on Sunday
30th June from 10 am until 4 pm.

The Big Green Village Picnic will feature local crafters, speakers and displays in order to demonstrate the ethos of biodiversity, recycling, nature and rewilding.

There will also be a band and entertainers at a free event with residents being encouraged to show their support for the environment by either walking or cycling to it. Residents are also being encouraged to bring their own "non plastic" picnics to enjoy on the day.

And the HEAT event organisers are looking for volunteers to help on the day.

"We would be grateful for volunteers to help our small HEAT group to make this a very enjoyable day for all the family," the organisers stated. Offers of help can be made by contacting deputy parish clerk Sara White by e-mail at: aoffice@hethersettparishcouncil.gov.uk

At February's meeting of Hethersett Parish Council, councillors agreed unanimously to support the event.

This is a drum I have been banging for sometime. I am utterly sick and tired of being told on television channels that "we are now going over for the news from where you live." only to find the bulletin mainly consists of news from places over 100 miles away. THIS IS NOT LOCAL NEWS.

Hethersett Herald's concept is simple. It brings you news, features, photographs and information with a genuine local perspective. We only have two criteria and those are our content must either

- Be about Hethersett or the immediate area or
- Be written by a resident of the village.

That's it, pure and simple and always will be. You won't find any news from Hertfordshire or Northamptonshire or Essex in our publication.

Problems with our village surgery rumbles on with more complaints on social media throughout the month. The Humbleyard practice has promised to improve its service, but we are still awaiting for those improvements to kick in.

The latest complaint revolves around telephone callers being told that only emergency appointments are being given on the phone. A number of people have pointed out that the last thing you want to have to do when you are feeling unwell is stand in a queue at the surgery to get an appointment that may not be on the same day.

I am hopeful that the practice manager will be invited to attend the March meeting of Hethersett Parish Council when he might be able to explain how the situation will improve in the future, having already admitted that the practice needs to do better.

It is very difficult to see how people's dreams of a new purpose built surgery on the North Hethersett development can become reality when there are so many problems at the existing surgery.

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## Village Stalwarts Are In The House

TWO Hethersett village stalwarts have been honoured by having houses at Hethersett Academy named after them.

The Academy recently changed the names of their four houses to honour local people who have made a significant contribution to society.

Perkins House (Green) is named after Mel Perkins MBE in recognition of his championing of a number of sports clubs in Hethersett. Mel is the founder of Hethersett Athletic Football Club and Hethersett Hawks Cycle Speedway Club. He is honorary president of the football club and chairman of the cycle speedway club and is also a trustee of Hethersett Memorial Playing Field. Mel was made an MBE in recognition of his sporting and other achievements.

Edwards House (Yellow) is named after leading Hethersett environmentalist Dr Anne Edwards BEM for her work in identifying plant diseases at the John Innes Institute. Dr Edwards is a leading light in the Hethersett Environmental Action Team (HEAT) and a Hethersett Parish Councillor. She has been awarded a British Empire Medal (BEM) for services to science.

The other two houses have been renamed in honour of award winning theatre producer Richard Jordan who was educated at the school and Lady Phillippa Dannatt who was the first female Lord Lieutenant of Norfolk and who lives at nearby Keswick.

Mel Perkins and Anne Edwards are photographed opposite. On its website the Academy said: "We are extremely proud of the House System we have created and the attached values. It embodies all that we stand for and is the vehicle in which our culture is lived through each day. It encourages pupil development through access to a wide range of experiences and motivates students to work together to share ideas, allowing them to learn from each other."







WORK has begun on a new three storey teaching block at Hethersett Academy. The new block will include classrooms, teaching areas and a new canteen. Writing on the school's website, principal Jane Diver said:

"I am delighted that we are to provide the physical expansion our community needs to cater for our increasing student numbers and to continue to facilitate a broad, innovative and aspirational curriculum. Our new canteen will allow students to socialise as young adults whilst maintaining the highest standards of behaviour. Our new technology rooms will enhance children's learning: enabling the development of creative thinking and problem-solving skills of the highest level."

### Academy Continues Its Popularity

HETHERSETT Academy has been named one of the most popular schools in the county in a new survey.

The survey was undertaken to name the schools in Norfolk that are oversubscribed with more pupils wanting to enter than spaces available.

The survey shows that 292 pupils put Hethersett Academy as their first choice but there were only 227 places available, making an over subscription of 65 places and meaning that 23% of the applicants were disappointed.

Notre Dame School in Norwich was named the most difficult school in the county to get into followed by Ormiston Venture Academy in Gorleston, Wymondham College and then Hethersett Academy.

There have been complaints recently from parents in Mulbarton, which is currently in the Academy catchment area, that youngsters from that village have not been given their first choice school—ie Hethersett Academy.

Proposed changes planned for September 2025 would see the new Cringleford Prep school added as a named feeder school for Hethersett - while Mulbarton Primary would instead become a named feeder school for Hewett Academy in Norwich.

# Oak Square For Sale For £1.6 Million

OAK Square in the centre of Hethersett is up for sale with a price tag of £1.6 million.

The square in the centre of the village consists of business and residential units.

The sale is described as 6500 square feet of retail, office and residential units with three traditional built detached buildings positioned around the car park in the centre of a busy village.

It states that the income from rents etc is approximately £118,320. The area has seven commercial premises, currently let as six and four residential premises.

"Long standing tenants comprise local estate agents, hairdressers, craft shop, a takeaway and office space.

"Enjoy the perks of a dynamic investment with a blend of commercial and residential properties. The current revenue stream of £118,320 per year is just the beginning, with ample room for growth through strategic rent reviews and renewals," the advert states.

"The portfolio comprises seven commercial premises, two of which are currently occupied by the same business, and four residential premises. The site offers 16 parking spaces and spans over approximately 0.34 acres," the advert continues.




It will be the latest in a long line of musicals performed by pupils from the school.

# **Helping With Searches**

Committed, skilful and hugely caring just a few of the words used to describe an army of volunteers who aid the police in their attempts to find missing people.

The Norfolk Lowland Search and Rescue charity is made up of volunteers of all ages and all occupations, all with one aim in mind to help find missing and vulnerable people.

They are highly trained in search procedure both on land and in water and are on call 24/7. They become an integral part of the search process as charity trustee Deb Chedgey told me:

"We are a highly trained group that are called upon early on in a search to support the police. You will often hear the phrase police aided by specialist groups. We will be one of the specialist groups," she said.


At the present time the group are called out around 50 times a year or virtually once a week on average. There are 47 active members with the youngest 21 and the oldest 75. The group also has a waiting list of people wanting to join.

But there is no Government funding and money has to be largely self-raised although some grants are available. At times the service has been adopted as other groups' chosen charity and this has happened at the Mundesley Motor Show for 2024. Debs estimates that it costs £18,000 a year just to cover basic running costs needed to keep the group active, taking into consideration the number of vehicles and boats that they utilise for any search. They have a room set aside for their work at the police training complex and also keep vehicles in Wroxham.

Ultimately, they would love to find an industrial unit somewhere in striking distance of the Norwich NDR where they can bring all the strands of their work together. Once called out the group spring into action with clearly defined roles that not only involve active searching but also running control units, taking logs,







Often when they start their search, the group will only have basic information on the person they are looking for. This will obviously include their name, what they were wearing when last seen and information about their state of mind that might make them particularly vulnerable.

The best-case scenario is they find the person alive and well, but this isn't always the case as many they are searching for have mental health issues or may have already committed suicide. This can obviously be very traumatic for anyone finding a body.

"If a body is found you can be left feeling rather deflated and sad," Deb said adding that many families have nevertheless expressed their gratitude for their efforts and their work even if the search ends in an unhappy outcome.



Deb is quick to point out that the volunteers are a tight knit group who care for and support each other.

"One of the most rewarding parts of what we do is being part of such a closely knit team," she said adding that the group is proud to be able to support Norfolk Police.

"We are search specialists and can take a lot of pressure off the Police to allow them to get on with other aspects of the search which may include investigation work," Deb said.

Debs (pictured opposite in the grounds at Hethersett) joined The Norfolk Lowland Search and Rescue group after



hearing about the search in Suffolk for missing airman Corrie McKeague in 2016. She became aware of a Suffolk search group and thought "I would like to do that."

Today she is one of six trustees of the group and is a key member of the welfare and fundraising teams and admits that she finds the work both interesting and rewarding with the searching process being very methodical and organised.

"We are always looking for the smallest clue to a missing person's whereabouts, something very small that might lead us to the person. Something like a mobile phone," Deb said.

Recently the group was involved in the search for missing Norwich woman Gaynor Lord whose body was eventually found in the River Wensum. Her disappearance made national news headlines. Now the group is gearing up for its big fundraising open day in Hethersett on June 15<sup>th</sup> from 10 am until 4 pm. There will be plenty of attractions such as a dog show, a tug-of-war competition between the emergency services, displays, stalls, food outlets, music from the Lee Vasey Band and much more. Entry will be free but donations for the group's work will be gratefully accepted. We will have more on the actual day in coming editions of Hethersett Herald.




# New Co-Op Opens

## Modern and Sustainable

The Co-op store, newly situated in Coachmaker Way, Hethersett, has been incredibly busy since its opening on the 16th of February.

Three days after its opening, I decided to go and have a look. The first thing I

noticed as I was walking towards it, were the solar panels on the roof of the building. There must be about 100 panels covering the entirety of the roof which impressed me as it shows the designers kept the environment in mind by utilising this sustainable way to produce power for the building.

Secondly, I noticed how much bigger it is than I had expected, possibly around double the size of Tesco on Great Melton Road. There is a very large car park which was fairly empty when I arrived at 4 pm on Monday evening compared to Tesco's car park which is always busy but in my opinion far too small.











Walking into the store I noticed multiple things. There was a fantastic range of products and multiple self serving machines for coffee and even a Tango ice blast machine, which I'm sure is enticing for children of parents doing their food shops. However, the bakery was considerably smaller than Tesco's and the hot food rack was completely empty (potentially due to the lateness of the evening and its popularity).

Making my way around, I was additionally impressed by the drinking water machine (an opportunity to fill up your bottle if you have one on you) encouraging fewer purchases of single use plastic. The prices for food were somewhat expensive if you compare cheaper budget stores such as Aldi and Lidl, but there were some good deals in place which made up for this.

Overall, I left the store impressed with it having surpassed my expectations. Not only is the store now the largest in the village and situated in an ever growing area of Hethersett, it is environmentally sustainable, modern and the prices were not as expensive as I had anticipated.

## Raising Money For NARS

EVERY year for the past goodness knows how long, Rosemary Warnes has held regular sales of all kinds of items from her home in Little Melton.

Passers-by grab a bargain and the money Rosemary raises goes to the Norfolk Accident Rescue Service. But Rosemary admits that the past year has been a difficult one with the rain and wet weather cutting down on the number of occasions that she has had goods outside.

Nevertheless she has raised £250 for the charity and over the years has raised thousands.

## **Appeal Over Hethersett Burglary**

POLICE are appealing for information following several residential burglaries in South Norfolk, including one in Hethersett.

Officers are investigating five burglaries in Cringleford, Fersfield, Hethersett, Keswick and Intwood between Wednesday 3rd January and Sunday 4th February when windows or doors were forced or smashed open and varying quantities of jewellery, phones and/or cash was stolen.

The most recent burglary happened on 4th February in Cringleford, when the ground-floor window of a property was forced open and jewellery and an electric bike and charger were stolen.

A man aged in his 40s has been arrested on suspicion of burglary in connection with the incident. He was taken to Wymondham Police Investigation Centre.


## A Lily For Remembrance of Loved Ones

## March World Day of Prayer

THE 2024 World Day of Prayer service took place in Hethersett Methodist Church at 2 pm on Friday 1st March.

This year's service was put together by the Christian women of Palestine who were asking the world to "connect with the land from where Jesus came, where he was born, ministered and died and from where the Christian faith has its roots."

Despite living in an area of the world where there is ongoing conflict and the future is uncertain, the women of Palestine were sharing with love a reminder that they are there and they want to give hope to everyone. The theme of the service was: "Bear with one another in love."

World Day of Prayer is an international, interchurch organisation led by women which enables us to hear the thoughts of those women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers.

The preparation for the day is vast. An international committee is



based in New York and there are national committees in each participating country. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans.

The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 146 countries. It begins in Samoa and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world – through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later.



## A Difficult and Challenging Year

Hethersett Parish Council chairman Bridget Williamson has admitted that the past year has been a difficult and challenging one.

Writing in the latest edition of the Hethersett Parish Council newsletter, Mrs Williamson says: "As you may know, this has been a very difficult time for us at Hethersett Parish Council, with our long standing clerk resigning in June 2023, and her replacement resigning after five weeks."

Mrs Williamson goes onto explain how the council has turned this round: "This situation also gave me the chair with the wonderful support of our deputy clerk, Sara White, to get to grips with our finances, enabling us to make informed decisions.

A great deal of time has been spent over the budget for 2024/2025 with cash reserves being put aside allowing for funding to be provided for replacement lighting and for the eventual future extension of the burial ground. CIL money from development will also help to keep the parish precept part of the council tax at a lower level for band A to D with only Band E and above paying slight increases. the same level and provide a new net on the tennis court at the village hall along with additional litter bins. The council has also set aside £3000 to start a fund for the replacement of play equipment on the Memorial Playing Field.

"Hethersett Parish Council is now in a strong position to continue to continue giving the residents of Hethersett the best value for money, using our resources to continue to improve facilities within our community in a clear and transparent way," the newsletter states.

# **Down Memory Lane**

## Memories of The Kinkajou—Squatting and GIs

One of the most fascinating pieces of Hethersett history for me is a café that no longer exists.

I know very little about the Kinkajou Café other than it was owned and run by Hilda Hagg who was mother of village stalwart Duncan Pigg who many residents will remember. Duncan died a couple of years ago in his mid 90s after enjoying a long and very productive life which saw him awarded a British Empire Medal for services to the village. All I really knew about the Kinkajou was that it was situated in the Kett's Oak area of the village in fields off what is now the B1172 and that it was frequented by American Gls stationed in the area during the Second World War.

The café became very popular with the Americans and it is highly likely that film star James (Jimmy) Stewart ate and drank there.

Despite a number of efforts I had been unable to find any photographs of the Kinkajou, until now when a very interesting article appeared on the Norwich Remembers Facebook site.

The initial post was about families living at Ketteringham Hall after the war and there was a photograph from the Eastern Daily Press newspaper from 1946 of a mother and baby who "squatted at the hall".

That picture was posted by local man Rob Lotus and you can view it later in this article. The caption was: "Mrs O. Hurrell of Hethersett, the first of the squatters to instal themselves in the deserted military camp in Ketteringham Park."

#### Rob Lotus wrote:

"Most people know Ketteringham Hall now for the Orangery Tea Rooms or for Ladybelt Park the other side of the lake, but during World War Two it was the headquarters of the 2nd Air Division of the 8th Airforce with nearly 200 buildings on site, but only three remain today.

"After the war many families started squatting in the empty buildings and later the council used Hethel to house people. The Ketteringham camp became a thriving community with the milkman and a baker calling and mail being delivered."

Richard Minter posted that his mother lived in a house behind the Kinkajou and had a GI boyfriend whom she may well have met in the café. Richard has a photograph of his mother and her boyfriend which is reproduced here with his permission.


Richard knows very little about the photograph other than the man's name is Gerry and he was a member of the 389th bomb group and his mother would have been aged anything from 17 to 19 years of age.

Meanwhile we were sent an amusing snippet of information by our reader Mary Parker who lives at Ketteringham. This extract comes from the diary of Caroline Boileau, age 19, daughter of Sir John Peter Boileau of Ketteringham Hall


"24th July 1847 Ama, Agnes, Charlie, Minnie and Baby (her siblings) to Hethersett Station to see the Stanleys (Bishop of Norwich, a family friend) go past. Smart (station master) told them a story of an old woman who came by train from Norwich meaning to be set down in Hethersett but who when Smart called out 'Hethersett' thinking he said 'Here we set' allowed herself to be carried on to Wymondham. When the train stopped there she was indignant declaring that she had intended to stop at Hethersett till a passenger told her it was her own fault as he had heard the man (Smart) at the station call out the name & then she found out her mistake."

### Charges For Enclosing Open Space

New bookings for events wanting to enclose the field at Hethersett Village Hall and charge the public entry will be charged £200 in the future.

Mrs Williamson questioned whether it was right for a public open space to be enclosed and brought the matter up again at the latest meeting.

After a lengthy discussion, councillors agreed that bookings already made should not be charged the fee, but it should be implemented with immediate effect for new bookings.

The fee will not be imposed for events held by groups not intending to exclusively control public entry.

Telephones to the parish office have been out of action for over seven weeks, councillors were told by parish clerk Penny Hubble.

The clerk told the meeting that she is in regular contact with BT and would be seeking compensation once the systems are up and running.

Hethersett Parish Council has been asked about the possibility of having a zebra crossing outside Hethersett VC Primary School in Queen's Road. But members heard that a new "lollipop person" is due to be in place from the end of February.

Salena Dawson has resigned from Hethersett Parish Council citing work commitments as a primary reason. It brings the current number of vacancies on the council to three.



We did some flower arranging and made some beautiful decorations to keep and also had the lovely Deano singing to us and we had a Valentines drama class and made such a lovely piece to display.







### Memories Of The Beast from the East

IT was six years ago in late February 2018 that the Beast from the East' hurtled into Norfolk.

The nation had an early warning of it and we were particularly attentive as my wife and I were staying in Old Hunstanton at the time. It was a case of whether to leave early to get back to Hethersett or continue the stay within the safe confines of the hotel.

On 26<sup>th</sup> February there were flurries of snow on Old Hunstanton beach. By late afternoon things had calmed so we decided to stay a further night.

On 27<sup>th</sup> February I looked out of our bedroom window in the early morning and things had changed dramatically. There was a build-up of snow and the wind had strengthened. Do we now stay at the hotel or make a break for it? We decided on the latter via a cross country route as there were reports of problems on the major roads owing to the volume of traffic.

After an early start all went well although the snow had started to settle. Our problem came on the road

#### How we brought you news of the Beast From the East in 2018

THE so called "Beast From the East" brought the worst weather conditions that Hethersett had experienced for many years. The end of February and the start of March saw deep snow, strong winds and freezing temperatures with wind chill making it feel like minus 10. The snow started on February 27th and then turned up with a vengeance on the last day of February. Ironically there was little improvement on March 1st which was technically the first day of Spring.

All four Hethersett schools were shut for days and it wasn't until over a week later that the weather improved significantly before a mini Beast turned up over the weekend of March 17th and 18th. Hethersett was a virtual ghost town on the roads were virtually deserted with only a handful of cars slipping and sliding to their destinations. The post office was shut, the doctors' surgery was badly affected with staff unable to make it in, the car parks





## A Massacre and A Major

Hethersett Herald columnist John Head remembers a massacre and a skilled musician.

AS most of the readers of the Hethersett Herald and Peter Steward's blog are aware we are both members of the Le Paradis Commemoration Group.

Our group was formed in 2016/17 to highlight and remember the massacre at Le Paradis which had become known as 'the forgotten massacre'.

This must not to be confused with the book of the same name by Guy Rommelaere which highlights the massacre on the following day (28<sup>th</sup> May 1940) of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion Royal Warwicks at Wormhoud (Wormhoudt) by the SS Liebstandarte Adolf Hitler.

The official launch of our Hell in Paradise website took place at Dereham Memorial Hall on 24<sup>th</sup> April 2018 since when this massacre has proved far from forgotten, not only culminating in a memorial in the grounds of Norwich Cathedral but by the number of persons and links we have created through the website which span the United Kingdom and as far as Australia.

One of these links came to mind when I saw Peter's blog in early January this year as he travelled to Eastbourne to be with the new addition to his family, Lyla Louise.

A couple of the photographs Peter had taken were of the bandstand on Eastbourne's sea front and a link to Le Paradis came flooding back demonstrating how far our research arm had extended.


On 27<sup>th</sup> May 1940 the 'Bataille de Paradis' involved not only 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion the Royal Norfolks but also 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion the Royal Scots. Both battalions fought side by side. After the surrender some members of these battalions were fortunate to be taken prisoners of war. One of these was Major Jimmy Howe MBE of The Royal Scots.

In 1943 he was repatriated as a medic to assist with wounded British prisoners who were also being repatriated.



Major Jimmy Howe was a skilled musician and after the war played an integral part in the remembrance services at Le Paradis which were organised by the Royal Scots and the Royal Norfolks, the latter as part of the Norfolk and Norwich Dunkirk Veterans Association.

Lifelong friendships were built between the battalions and invaluable information exchanged concerning the build-up, defence, surrender and massacre at Le Paradis, notably a letter exchange between Bob Brown (Royal Norfolks) and Jimmy Howe (Royal Scots) of their memories when they were both defending Le Paradis.



In 1949 Major Jimmy Howe became Bandmaster of The Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders and in 1970 was appointed Senior Director of Music (Guards Division). He was responsible for organising music for Trooping of the Colour, the annual London Cenotaph Armistice Parade and providing orchestras for state banquets at Buckingham Palace and Windsor Castle. His MBE was awarded for services to military music.

Major Howe retired from the army in 1974 and went on to direct concerts for the BBC. In 1983 he moved to Eastbourne where he was closely involved in organising band concerts and was vice president of the national ex-prisoner of war association and president of the Eastbourne branch of the Dunkirk Veterans' Association. During the 1960s and 70s he brought The Scots Guards Band to Eastbourne for two weeks of concerts each year.

He regularly attended the pilgrimages organised by the Royal Norfolks and Royal Scots to the annual commemoration services at Le Paradis.

In 2002 his autobiography 'A Conductor's Journey' was published. He died in 2005 at the age of 87.

I have taken the reader on Major Jimmy Howes 'Conductor's Journey' but it was Peter Steward's journey to Easbourne that brought back the relationships the Le Paradis Commemoration Group had discovered over the recent years between the two battalions following our research into the atrocity.


